FOURTH OF JULY FUN FACTS

- In July 1776 there was an estimated 2.5 million people living in the newly independent nation.
- According to the US Census Population the nation's estimated population on this July Fourth is 311.7 million.
- The wrong date was put on the Declaration of Independence. Congress actually voted for our independence on July 2nd but by the time the Declaration of Independence got to the printer it was actually July 4th and that was the date that was put on the top of it. It didn't actually start getting signed until August.
- The first July 4th celebration was held in Philadelphia on July 4, 1777 with bonfires, bells and fireworks.
- The Declaration of Independence is read every year on the 4th of July in Philadelphia.
- There are approximately 15,000 fireworks displays to celebrate the day.
- In the past, Americans have spent approximately \$6.8 billion to celebrate America's birthday.
- That is approximately \$71.34 per household.



FAMOUS LAST WORDS

On July 4, 1826, exactly 50 years after the Declaration of Independence first asserted American sovereignty, former presidents John Adams and Thomas Jefferson both passed away. Jefferson desired to live until July 4 so "that he might breathe the air of the Fiftieth Anniversary." His last words, spoken the night before his death in the early afternoon of July 4, are traditionally given as some variation of "Is it the Fourth?" Adams died in the early evening, hours after Jefferson. According to tradition, Adams uttered the final words, "Thomas Jefferson survives," unaware of the fact that his longtime friend had just passed away.
